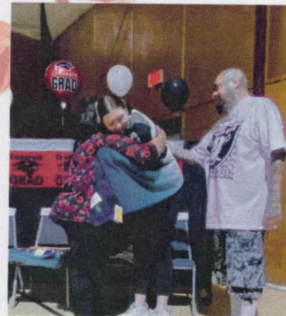
2023 GRADUATION PARTY

Employment Opportunity for Youth 14-24 years of age

The Native Workforce Development (NWD) program is federally funded on a four-year cycle under the Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA) of 1998 by the U.S. Department of Labor, Section 166, – Indian & Native American Programs. The purpose of the program is to develop academic, occupational and literacy skills; to increase competitiveness in the workforce; to promote economic and social development; and to achieve personal and economic self-sufficiency for Native American, Alaska Native & Native Hawaiian individuals residing in the State of Nevada through employment and training activities. Eligibility Requirements – 1) Enrolled in the NWD Program, if not currently enrolled, contact NWD to make an appointment to enroll; 2) Be Native American, Alaskan Native or Hawaiian Native; 3) Reside on Reservation, Colony or Native lands; 4) Meet household income eligibility; 5) contact Debbie or Amanda for more information (775) 273-7861

Required Documentation – 1) Picture ID/Age; 2) Social Security card; 3) Tribal Verification; 4) Proof of Residency; 5) Selective Service Registration (Males 18+ years only).

Income Eligibility - 1) Economically Disadvantaged, Proof of total family (household) income for the last 6 months (pay stubs, Public Assistance, TANF, SSI, etc. 2) Unemployed; or 3) Underemployed.

Youth Employment Guide for Non-Agricultural Work

The Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) of 1938 sets standards for youth employment.

What are the Minimum Age Standards for Non-Agricultural Employment?

Once you reach 18 years of age, you are no longer subject to the federal youth employment provisions. Youths age 16 and 17 can work for unlimited hours in any occupation other than those declared hazardous by the Secretary of Labor. If you are 14 or 15 years old, you can work outside school hours in a variety of non-manufacturing and non-hazardous jobs for limited periods of time and under specified conditions. Any work not specifically permitted is prohibited. If you are under 14 years old, you cannot work in non-agricultural occupations covered by the FLSA. You can only do work exempt from the FLSA (such as delivering newspapers and acting). Children of any age are generally permitted to work for businesses entirely owned by their parents, except those under age 16 cannot be employed in mining or manufacturing and no one under 18 can be employed in any occupation the Secretary of Labor has declared to be hazardous.

Hours of Work for 14- and 15-Year-Olds

Outside of school hours

No more than 3 hours on a school day when school is in session.

No more than 8 hours on a non-school day when school is not in session.

No more than 18 hours during a week when school is in session.

No more than 40 hours during a week when school is not in session.

Between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., except between June 1 and Labor Day when the evening hour extends to 9:00 p.m.

There are some exceptions for 14- and 15-year-old students enrolled in Work Experience and Career Exploration Programs (WECEP) and Work Study Programs (WSP).

Permitted Occupations for 14- and 15-Year-Olds

You can work in most office jobs and retail and food service establishments.

You can work in occupations such as bagging groceries, office work, and stocking shelves.

You can perform limited kitchen work involving the preparation of food and beverages.

Properly certified 15-year-olds **can work** as lifeguards and swimming instructors at traditional swimming pools and water amusement parks.

Occupations that are Not Permitted

You cannot work in any of the jobs prohibited by the Hazardous Occupations Orders or in most occupations involving transportation, construction, warehousing, communications, and public utilities.

You cannot work in processing, mining, in any workroom or workplace where goods are manufactured or processed, in freezers, or in meat coolers.

You cannot operate or tend any power-driven machinery, except office machines.

You cannot perform any baking operations.

You cannot perform youth peddling, sign waving, or door-to-door sales activities.

You cannot work from ladders, scaffolds, or their substitutes.

Minors Under 18 are Prohibited From Working in the Following Occupations Declared Hazardous by the Secretary of Labor:

- 1 Work in most jobs where explosives are manufactured or stored.
- 2 Driving a motor vehicle or work as an outside helper on motor vehicles. Seventeen-year-olds can drive under strictly limited conditions.
- 3 Most jobs in coal mining.
- 4 Occupations in forest fire fighting, forest fire prevention, timber tract, forestry service, and occupations in logging and sawmilling.
- 5 Operating most power-driven woodworking machines.
- 6 Occupations where minors are exposed to radioactive materials.
- 7 Operating, riding on, and assisting in operating most power-driven hoisting apparatus.
- 8 Operating certain power-driven metal-working machines.
- 9 Mining at metal mines, quarries, aggregate mines, etc.
- 10 Operating power-driven meat processing machines, such as meat slicers, as well as cleaning the equipment. Also working most jobs in meat and poultry slaughtering and packing plants.
- 11 Operating power-driven bakery machines.
- 12 Operating all balers, compactors, and power-driven paper-products machines. Youths age 16 and 17 can load, but not operate or unload, certain scrap paper balers and paper box compactors under very specific guidelines.
- 13 Manufacturing brick, tile, and related products.
- 14 Operating power-driven circular saws, band saws, guillotine shears, chain saws, reciprocating saws, wood chippers, and abrasive cutting discs.
- 15 Wrecking, demolition, and ship-breaking work.
- 16 Roofing operations and work performed on or about a roof.
- 17 Trenching and excavation operations.

The regulations provide a limited exemption from hazardous occupations 5, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 and 17 for apprentices and student-learners who are at least 16 years of age and enrolled in approved programs.

Required Documentation

To be eligible all applicants must be Native American, Alaskan Natives or Hawaiian Natives, Economically Disadvantaged, Unemployed or Underemployed. All documentation must be provided at the time of intake to be certified eligible for the NWD 2023 Summer Youth Employment program.

- ⇒ **Picture Identification/Age:** State ID card or Driver License, Birth Certificate, School ID, Tribal ID.
- ⇒ **Social Security Card:** SS Card or Letter or Documentation from Social Security Office
- ⇒ **Tribal Verification:** Tribal Enrollment Card, Certificate of Indian Blood, Tribal Documents
- ⇒ **Proof of Residency:** Utility Bill, Rent Receipt, Voter Registration Card, Lease Agreement
- ⇒ **Selective Service Registration:** (Males Only): Registration Card, Letter from Selective Service, Online Verification

Applicants must also be income eligible:

- ◆ **If Economically Disadvantaged:**
Proof of total family (household) income for the last 6 months, Pay Stubs, Public Assistance (i.e. SNAP, TANF, Commodity Foods, SITS, etc.)
- ◆ **Unemployed:**
Letter from Unemployment Office, Lay-off Notice
- ◆ **Underemployed:**
Proof of working less than full time



SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

Summer Youth Program 2023

The Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, (ITCN) Native Workforce Development Program (NWD) receives federal funding to administer a Supplemental Youth Services Program (SYSP). The NWD provides subsidized summer youth employment as funds are available on a year-to-year basis. The number of youth employed are dependent on the funding amounts for each given year.

The summer youth employment for 2023 will provide services for 7 weeks of employment for youth during the summer months. Wages will be \$8.50 per hour for not more than 30 hours per week. The positions will be allocated in according to the number of requests received in a timely manner from tribal entities. All worksites are designated to tribal lands/areas only.

ALL CHILD LABOR LAWS APPLY

Workforce Investment Act

The Native Workforce Development (NWD) program is federally funded on a four-year cycle under the Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA) formerly known as the Workforce Investment (WIA) Act of 1998 by the U.S. Department of Labor – Division of Indian & Native American Programs.

The purpose of the program is to develop academic, occupational and literacy skills; to increase competitiveness in the workforce; to promote economic and social development; and to achieve personal and economic self-sufficiency for Native American, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian individuals residing in the State of Nevada through employment and training activities.

Eligibility

Under the WIOA component an individual may qualify for the program if they are a Native American, Alaska Native or Native Hawaiian who is economically disadvantaged, unemployed or underemployed or employed but in need of program services to obtain or retain employment as determined by the program.

VETERANS PRIORITY OF SERVICE

The program is required to provide priority of services for veterans and eligible spouses pursuant to 20CFR part 1010. This regulation implements priority of service for veterans and eligible spouses in DOL job training programs under the Jobs for Veterans Act published at 73 Fed. Reg. 78132 on Dec. 18, 2008.

Supplemental Youth Services Program (SYSP)

SYSP is designed for low-income youth ages 14-24 who are Native American, Alaska Native or Native Hawaiian residing on a reservation/colony.

If not low income eligibility may be determined if youth is one of the following:

- School Dropout
- Basic Skills Deficient
- Educational attainment that is one or more grade levels below the grade level appropriate to the age of the individual
- Pregnant or Parenting
- Individuals with Disabilities, including learning disabilities
- Homeless or Runaway Youth
- Offenders

Supplemental Youth Services Include:

Improving Educational and Skill Competencies;
Adult Mentoring; Support Services; Leadership Development; Tutoring/Study Skills; Paid/Unpaid Work Experience/ Internships/Job Shadowing; Leadership Development; Guidance and Counseling; Job Development and Outreach.
